A special note of gratitude goes out to those who bolster our efforts by volunteering or by donating to us. I would also like to acknowledge the ongoing support of our Wild & Scenic Film Festival sponsors who contribute to our financial viability and believe in our vision. You are awesome!

In that same 1998 newsletter mentioned above, there's another quote that offers valuable guidance for today. In the award-winning book, Seeing the Forest Among the Trees, BC forest ecologist Herb Hammond wrote "We do not sustain the forest; the forest sustains us."

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The impacts of a global pandemic and the extreme weather events and disasters fuelled by climate change were the greatest challenges for everyone in 2021. All of this increases the pressure on sensitive alpine and subalpine areas, forests, grasslands, and wetlands. We believe that a better understanding of environmental issues will inspire citizens to take action in their own lives and live in mutual reciprocity with nature. 8th Annual Wild & Scenic Film Festival

Thank you to everyone for supporting our annual fund raising event! Through ticket sales, a silent auction and sponsorships, we raised \$15,123. Over 500 people tuned in to the hybrid festival: 200 in person and 300 people virtually, for an evening of nine films. The program was also made available to local schools, with 7 classes and over 150 students taking part, as well as a group of youth at the Summit Youth Centre.

BC Rivers Day

In partnership with Lake Windermere Ambassadors and Living Lakes Canada, 25 enthusiastic paddlers floated from Invermere to Radium on September 21 in this annual celebration of our waterways.

Ursus & Us: Bear Day

Over 250 people, including many happy children, learned about living in bear country through this outdoor event in Pothole Park. There were opportunities to try out bear spray, make apple juice with Groundswell's fruit press (a reminder that fruit must be picked to keep bears out of our yards), speak with our local Conservation Officer, Greg Kruger, about keeping safe around bears, and make a bear print tote back with Wildsight. There was also story time with the Invermere Library and environmental education games with ColumbiaYEA.

Protect and conserve our local natural environment and species to ensure that thriving resilient ecosystems endure into the future

Mountain Goat Conservation

Our ongoing efforts to ensure the preservation of mountain goats in our region publicly commenced with a webinar featuring renowned biologist, author and mountain goat researcher Douglas Chadwick in April 2021. The webinar attracted over 220 participants from countries including Canada, the United States, Australia and Germany.

Lake Enid Restoration

Lake Enid Restoration - To continue our conservation efforts we are partnering with Recreation Sites and Parks BC to construct fencing to protect an impacted section of the park. Due to technical issues this will continue into 2022.

Wilmer Wetlands

In collaboration with Environment Canada, Shuswap Band and Ktunaxa Nation, we created and installed four new educational signs at the Wilmer Unit of the Columbia Wetlands National Wildlife Area.

Raise awareness and engagement on climate change actions, informed by current science and based on best practices.

Expanded Capacity

We hired a Climate Change program assistant through Canada Summer Jobs to assist our Climate Resilience Coordinator work on the Climate Pledge, Fridays for Future, webinars and general program support.

Climate Pledge

The Climate Pledge was designed to empower citizens to take action to reduce personal and community greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and thereby counteract climate change through inspiring, hands-on activities and events. Nearly 100 folks signed on.

Nature-Based Climate Solutions Webinar

In partnership with Nature Canada, the Columbia River Salmon Reintroduction Initiative and Protect our Winters, we hosted a webinar on nature-based climate solutions that attracted an audience of 129.

Fridays for Future

We gathered a small but vocal group of local residents and youth to support the Global Fridays for Future movement on September 24.

Green your home 101

We held a webinar with local businesses Thinkbright and Kootenay Solar to answer green retrofit questions.

EV Show

Our second annual electric vehicle show highlighted 16 different EV cars, enthralling the 180 people who attended.

RURAL CANADA'S FIRST ELECTRIC VEHICLE SHARE



Wildsight Invermere officially launched the first electric vehicle share program in rural Canada in 2020. Having an EV share in the Columbia Valley allows residents and visitors alike to try out an EV and have all of their usage and maintenance questions answered before leaping to purchase – an enormous advantage given that an EV represents a serious investment for many. For both individuals and businesses, it is an opportunity to drive emissions-free and contribute to a carbon-free future.

Spark continues to add new members every month and is up to 83 members now. We continue to be challenged by COVID restrictions but have great plans to reach out to new people this summer. We also continue to promote the use of Spark to local businesses and both Alpenglow Bakery and the Outdoor Learning Store have seen the benefit.
