MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR

Nature has reinforced important lessons to us over the last year. Be adaptable, resourceful and ready to hunker down when a storm blows in. While 2020 will be remembered for the challenges (and much hunkering down), I am happy to report that, for Wildsight Invermere, there were also opportunities.

Through the dedication of our volunteer Board of Directors and the tenacity of our part-time Branch Manager, Karen Barkley, we have managed to keep our good ship afloat and to make things happen even though we weren't able to get together.

We received a significant boost in organizational capacity through various federal government grants. With special "green jobs in natural resources" funding, we hired our first-ever Climate Change and Resilience Coordinator. That's how Kat Graves, a recent graduate with a Masters of Science in Environmental Planning, came to us in September on an 8-month internship. She loves the Columbia Valley and will continue to work with us in a full-time position and, in her words, share her "passion for protecting the invaluable interspecies connections that constitute our biosphere." The correlation between biodiversity, community sustainability and resiliency has led us to focus more on climate change. This is where Karen and Kat have been able to effectively lead the charge.

Connecting with and protecting our wild spaces continues to be a priority for us. This is especially important with recreational trails becoming busier than ever. In collaboration with the Canadian Wildlife Service, Shushwap Indian Band and Ktunaxa Nation, we've launched a wetlands project to create new educational signs at the entrance to the Wilmer Unit of the Columbia National Wildlife Area. Also in the works is a mountain goat awareness campaign, designed to safeguard the future for an iconic species that both represents and requires wilderness

Recently, I was pleasantly reminded that we've been trailblazers for a long time. In a stack of Wildsight's early newsletters (back when we were called East Kootenay Environmental Society), there was a call to action by the Invermere Branch around climate change. That was in 1998. While global progress around the issue has been achingly slow, we hope that we can continue to inspire our local community and government to make positive changes. As this pandemic has showed us, we're all connected and we all need to pitch in, no matter where we live on this big, blue planet.

7th Annual Wild & Scenic Film Festival

Over 300 people tuned in to our virtual festival for an evening of nine films. The program was also made available to local schools, with 8 classes and over 200 students taking part.

BC Rivers Day

18 enthusiastic paddlers floated from Invermere to Radium on September 27 in this annual celebration of our waterways.

Ursus & Us: Bear Day

170 people learned more about living in bear country through this outdoor event in Pothole Park. There were opportunities to try out bear spray, make apple juice with Groundswell's fruit press (a reminder that fruit must be picked to keep bears out of our yards), speak with our local Conservation Officer, Greg Kruger, about keeping safe around bears, and hear stories and advice by guest speaker Reno Sommerhalder.








SPARK

RURAL CANADA'S FIRST ELECTRIC VEHICLE SHARE



Wildsight Invermere officially launched the first electric vehicle share program in rural Canada in 2020. Having an EV share in the Columbia Valley allows residents and visitors alike to try out an EV and have all of their usage and maintenance questions answered before leaping to purchase – an enormous advantage given that an EV represents a serious investment for many. For both individuals and businesses, it is an opportunity to drive emissions-free and contribute to a carbon-free future.

In the past year, although we were challenged to launch Spark during the pandemic, we have had 46 new users sign up since August 2020. We continue to promote the use of Spark to local businesses and both Alpenglow Bakery and the Outdoor Learning Store have seen the benefit.




