Crow or Raven?

Do you have a look-a-like, face-double, or doppelganger? Some birds look so much like other birds that it's really hard to tell them apart. Crow and Ravens are two such birds. Both are common in British Columbia and both live in rural and urban areas. So, how DO you tell them apart?

Remember, when watching birds, important characteristics to notice are: colour, size, shape, behaviour. Colour is the easiest identifier of most birds, but not in this case—both are solid black! That means you need to look closer at their other features. Have a look at the photos and chart below, then head outside to see if you can correctly identify the mystery black bird in your neighbourhood!
